WELCOME

Pastor: Today we welcome you to our Blue Christmas service, a service that has been put together especially for those of us who are not feeling particularly merry and bright right now.

> Those of us feeling a little blue at this time of year can feel edged out and forgotten as everyone else seems caught up in the mad frenzy of their own preparations and celebrations. We hope that tonight, as you feel Christ's love and peace surrounding you, you'll find comfort and hope in knowing that you are not alone.

PRAYER

Pastor: God of mercy and love, we gather here today as hurting people, bringing our pain, our sorrow and our confusion to this safe space. Loving God, meet us in our darkness, and give us freedom to struggle together as we seek your presence. We ask for strength for today, courage for tomorrow and peace from the past.

LIGHT THE CHRIST CANDLE

SCRIPTURE *John 1:1-5* In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

THE EMPTY CHAIR

Pastor: This empty chair represents those who won't be home for Christmas.

Perhaps a relationship has ended, perhaps the people we love will be far away, perhaps family relationships are strained, perhaps sickness or death have changed how things used to be...

LIGHT THE FIRST CANDLE

Pastor: We light this first candle to remember those we have loved and lost and those who are not able to be with us.

We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices and the memories of them that we hold in our hearts.

[Silent reflection]

Pastor: We thank God for them and ask for God's comfort, and when we are feeling overcome with sadness, we ask for the peace that is greater than we can ever understand.

All: Lord hear our prayer.

LIGHT THE SECOND CANDLE

Pastor: The empty chair also represents the pain and sadness that can come from other events that enter our lives, uninvited and unwanted – leaving us reeling in pain and shock, unable to shake the feeling that it wasn't supposed to be like this.

So we light this candle to represent other losses that we find ourselves faced with.

The loss of health,
employment,
independence,
freedom,
the loss of confidence or security,
plans that did not work out,
hopes that ended in despair.

We pause now for you to tell the God who longs to bind up those who are broken-hearted, about some of the losses that you are feeling at this time.

[Silent reflection]

All: Lord hear our prayer.

LIGHT THE THIRD CANDLE

Pastor: This candle represents our courage: the courage to face our sadness, to share our feelings with others, our doubts and fears, our anger, frustration or depression, and to dare to hope in the depths of our pain.

We pause now for you to tell the God who longs to take you by the hand and say to you, "Do not fear, I will help you find hope and courage for another day."

[Silent reflection]

All: Lord hear our prayer.

LIGHT THE FOURTH CANDLE

Pastor: We light this fourth candle to remember those who have supported us in our pain.

We pause to remember the prayers, the words of comfort and support, the acts of kindness from family and friends and those who stood with us in our time of need.

[Silent reflection]

Pastor: We thank you God for sending your Son Jesus so that we are never alone. And we thank you for sending others who are your hands and heart.

All: Amen.

Pastor: The carol before us expresses the longing the Israelites felt as they waited for God to send the deliverer He had promised. As we sing together, you may remain seated and rest in God's healing presence.

HYMN O Come, O Come, Emmanuel

FOCUS ON THE CHRIST CANDLE

Pastor: Standing here in the center of the candles that represent some of life's joy and pain, this Christ candle represents Jesus who has come to be Emmanuel, God with us, in the midst of it all.

Jesus who was born as a helpless baby – but who hears our cries and understands how weak and helpless we can feel.

Jesus the good shepherd, who knows our hearts and offers us healing and hope in the midst of our suffering, who came to help us understand just how much God loves us, who lived and died to restore our relationship with our Heavenly Father.

Jesus, who will reign as King over God's new creation, where there will be no more sickness or death or crying or pain for all eternity; who has given us his Holy Spirit to help, comfort and guide us as we seek to follow him here on earth and wait for his glorious return.

PRAYER

Pastor: Let's pray. Oh God, be with us in our darkness. Make your face shine upon us and give us peace.

We pray for your Holy Spirit to be at work within us as we are gathered here today. May your Holy Spirit comfort us, sustain us and remind us of your constant love.

We open our hearts and minds to listen to you. Help us hear what you have to say.
