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From the Desk of Pastor Kathy:

The Final Scapegoat

Dear Friends in Christ,

We are entering Holy Week with our attention focused on the cross and what Jesus has done for our salvation. I have found a helpful explanation of Christ's death in a book called *Transforming Leadership*. The authors, Norma Cook Everist and Craig L. Nessan identified the human tendency to resolve conflict by finding someone to blame. "Whenever fear and anxiety levels are raised," they claim, "human groups inevitably gravitate toward the identification of a specified individual or group as the cause of that fear or anxiety." I find this to be true in all kinds of ways. Sociologists see it manifested in rituals and stories of people and call it the "scapegoat mechanism." Psychologists recognize the "blame cycle" at work in marriages and other family systems. Scapegoating is at the core of sin and how it is lived out in our relationship with God and one another. From the beginning of time, the fingers were pointing. Adam blamed Eve and Eve blamed the serpent for this first act of defiance against God's will.

I encourage you to take a moment to reflect on your own life. Begin to name the various people or institutions or situations that you have blamed in the last several months. We have seen how this vicious cycle has spun as the world is dealing with the pandemic. It has become political, with fingers pointing in all directions. The divisions are deep and injustice prevails. When our sentences begin with an "if only," then we have targeted our scapegoat. When we do not like the change that takes place, we often try to find someone to blame. Just pay attention to an argument and you will most likely see this behavior.

It doesn't have to be like this. There is another way; it is the way of Christ.

In the story of Jesus' death, we see the scapegoat pattern at work. Jesus was the scapegoat as Religious leaders, the Roman government and the crowds, called for his crucifixion. As you know, Jesus did not deserve to be executed. Jesus died as the final scapegoat. As a result, the events of Holy Week remind us that we need not turn other people into scapegoats. The blame cycle stops at the foot of the cross. This is where the power of the Resurrection changes our lives. Jesus did not rise from the dead to get even. The living Christ is present and at work in our lives to break the cycle and reverse the course of sin and death. Love wins....always!

My prayer for us as a congregation is that we grow in our understanding of God's love so that we bear witness to the living Christ in the ways we love and care for each other and especially the others we may not yet know and who are possibly most different from us. These are our neighbors to love. As Jesus said, Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.

This is how we celebrate God's love and serve in Jesus' name!

CARING CUPBOARD MINISTRY

The Caring Cupboard Coordination Team (Andrea & Brad Hersh, Jill and Mitch Keeney, Bob & Barbara Strangfeld) held its first meeting on Tuesday, March 5. Thanks to the efforts of Doug West, the Social Ministry Team, the Youth Group and church members, the Caring Cupboard has been able to help many, many adults and children in our community with emergency food supplies in their time of need. The Coordination Team was formed to assure that this much needed ministry will continue to serve these needs.

At its first meeting the Coordination Team adopted the following Mission Statement:

In response to the biblical question, "Lord, when did we see you hungry?", the mission of the St. Matthew Caring Cupboard is to provide emergency food supplies available 24 hours a day. 7 days a week to all those in our community who may suffer from hunger and food insecurity regardless of cause."

The Coordination Team and members of the Social Ministry Team will be monitoring the Caring Cupboard daily to insure it is adequately stocked. In addition, we have organized a stockpile food closet in the Church Administration Building. Food donations for the Caring Cupboard may be placed directly in the Cupboard itself at any time. The Cupboard is located in front of the Church Building. Donations can also be left in the box provided at the church entrance nearest to the elevator or brought to the Administration Building during regular hours. THE COVID TASK FORCE recommended to Church Council and it was approved for indoor worship to begin the weekend of March 20/21. Saturday evening service will be held in Fellowship Hall at 5 p.m.; Sunday we will continue the drive-in service at 9 a.m. and indoor worship in the Nave will be held at 10:45. Everyone must wear a mask when in the building and social distancing will be maintained. We ask that you cooperate with the ushers and service assistants as they seat you safely for worship.

Guidelines for Returning to Indoor Worship

Doors will open 15 minutes before service begins.

Masks will be required.

We ask that everyone practice social distancing (at least 6 feet, excluding households) when in the church building. Please do not gather in the hallways. Conversations can be held outside the building.

For those who are feeling ill, have compromised immune systems, or are at high risk, please continue to utilize our drive-in service or on-line worship opportunities for your safety and the safety of others.

All hymnals, pens, papers, etc. have been removed from the pew racks.

Everyone will enter through the elevator lobby doors and porte-co-chere doors. No one should park in the porte-co-chere. The area needs to be accessible for emergency vehicles to enter and exit.

Bulletins, communion cups with wafers and Ziploc baggies (for empty communion cups) will be handed out as people enter. A waste basket for the communion cup baggies will be placed at the exits.

Seating will be as directed by the Ushers with social distancing being practiced (one household unit per pew or 2 individuals.) Pews will be marked for seating, with two empty pews between the seated rows. Please be kind and cooperate with the ushers.

The men's and women's bathrooms outside of Fellowship Hall will be available for use. Linda will be available to clean between uses.

Everyone will exit through the door they entered and as directed by the ushers. The ushers will release everyone a row at a time.

There will be no nursery care available.

Indoor worship will take place in the Nave at 10:45 a.m. with masks, social distancing and humming of the hymns.
